Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS)

Students must earn 144 credits to graduate. A minimum of 20 credits per semester and 40 credits per year are required. Up to 24 credits may be transferred from other recognised universities or the SWAYAM platform, adjustable against optional courses only. A maximum of 8 credits in non-law subjects is permitted.

SCHOLARSHIPS

NLUO offers merit-cum-means scholarships to deserving students from the second year onwards, and actively disseminates information about external scholarship opportunities from government and private agencies.

Promotion & Attendance Rules

A student must accumulate 80 credits in the first two years to be promoted to the Third Year. A minimum attendance of 75% in each course is mandatory; students falling below this threshold are not eligible to appear in the End-Semester Examination for that course.

EARNING WHILE LEARNING

A student aid scheme allowing eligible students to serve in the University Library or contribute to ongoing research projects in lieu of remuneration, helping them manage financial constraints without compromising their studies.

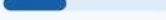
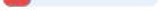

Each student is evaluated on 100 marks per subject, taking six subjects per semester, making 600 the total evaluation score each semester. The grading scale is as follows:

Each semester comprises six subjects evaluated at 100 marks each, giving a total evaluable score of 600 marks per semester across the programme.

Minimum Attendance

Students must maintain at least 75% attendance in every course. Those falling below this threshold are barred from appearing in the End-Semester Examination for that subject.

Year II Promotion

A student must accumulate a minimum of 80 credits across the first two years to be eligible for promotion to the Third Year of the LL.B. programme.

CGPA

The Cumulative Grade Point Average is calculated by dividing the sum of (grade value × credits earned) across all subjects by the total credits attempted. The maximum achievable CGPA under this system is 8.0, corresponding to an Outstanding (O) grade in all subjects. Employers may request CGPA certificates directly from the Examination Cell at NLUO.

RESEARCH PROJECTS AND COLLABORATIONS

PRISON ADVOCACY PROJECT

The Prison Advocacy Project is a transformative initiative funded by the Azim Premji Foundation. Focused on systemic reform, the project addresses pressing issues within the incarceration system, including prisoner rights, legal aid for undertrial prisoners, and rehabilitation strategies. The project is envisioned to improve access to justice, promote prisoner welfare, and develop sustainable frameworks for advocacy and reform.

The KHOJ (Know Your High Court Judges) Project aims to prepare a comprehensive dataset on all High Court judges. The dataset of KHOJ project was launched on 17 September at the National Law University Odisha by Chief Justice of India U.U. Lalit, Justice D.Y. Chandrachud, Justice M.R. Shah and former Orissa High Court Chief Justice D S. Muralidhar.

START-UP ODISHA

The main objective of the MOU is to provide all types of legal assistance to Startup Odisha, conduct seminars, workshops, Startup Weekends, training Programmes in collaboration with Startup Odisha, Collaborative research and teaching, research findings, and publications. The terms and conditions of the MOU is executed through Lexitech - Centre for Law, Entrepreneurship and Innovation, NLUO.

The National Commission for Women along with NLUO is conducting a Women Safety Audit project in Asansol, a city situated in West Bengal. The audit aims to understand what makes public spaces safe, identify reasons for poor safety, and create a roadmap for building secure cities by proactively addressing these issues. The purpose of this study is to evaluate the safety concerns encountered by women within the city.

TOBACCO CONTROL PROJECT

NLUO in collaboration with the International Union Against Tuberculosis and Lung Disease is working on a policy intervention project titled "Supporting stronger and evidence-based tobacco control initiatives through capacity building strengthening laws, policies and institutional mechanisms with multi-stakeholder engagements towards tobacco-free India. The objectives of the project inter alia include strengthening tobacco control laws in Odisha, supporting the Odisha government in adopting stronger policies and capacity building of stakeholders.

In July, 2023, National Law University Odisha, Cuttack entered into an agreement with the Netherlands Embassy to implement a project titled Addressing Domestic Violence in Odisha through Institutionalized Domestic Violence Response Protocols. The project is funded by the Human Rights Fund. The project is for a period of two years and is led by Prof. Rangin Pallav Tripathy and Assoc. Prof. Suman Dash Bhattamishra. The project aims at establishing institutionalized domestic violence Response Protocols response protocols in the state of Odisha to enhance the victims' access to justice.

NLUO BOSE & MITRA & CO. INTERNATIONAL MARITIME ARBITRATION MOOT (IMAM)

The Moot Society's flagship event - International Maritime Arbitration Moot, currently the biggest maritime arbitration moot in India, is organized in March annually. We, at NLUO, have chosen Maritime Law as the subject matter to complement the maritime operations in Odisha and consequently, promote intellectual discourse in the field of Maritime Law. 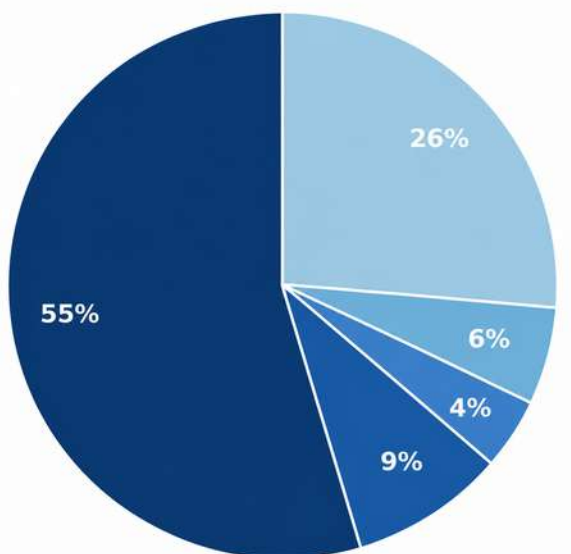

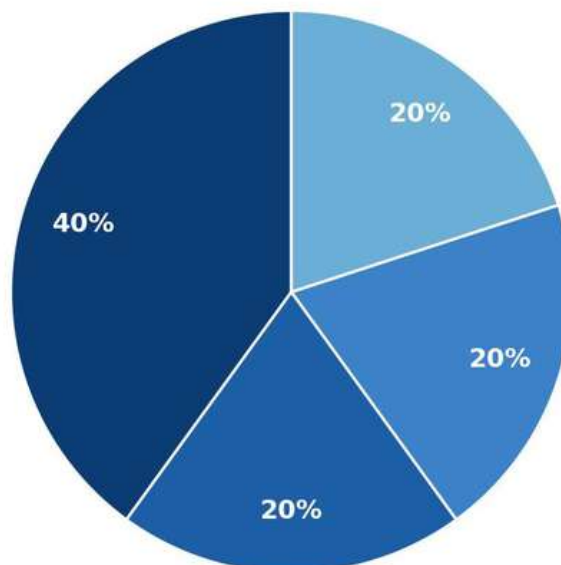

RECRUITMENT PROCESS

INITIAL COMMUNICATION WITH THE RECRUITER

The Recruitment Coordination Committee, NLUO, shall send invitations to recruiters along with the placement brochure and relevant information. Alternatively, an organisation may approach the Recruitment Coordination Committee by writing to 3yearllbrecruitment@nluo.ac.in.

PRE-PLACEMENT TALKS

Recruiters are invited to organize Pre-Placement Talks at the University for interested students. During these sessions, valuable information such as organizational profiles, career advancement opportunities, compensation packages, and more can be shared. These presentations can take place ahead of the Pre-Interview Screening process.

PRE-INTERVIEW SCREENING

Recruiters have the option to carry out a Pre-Interview Screening, which may include group discussions or written tests at any point before the actual interview day. Recruiters have the flexibility to establish their own screening policies to shortlist candidates. In instances where a Recruiter doesn't specify a particular Pre-Interview Screening method, the curriculum vitae of all interested students will be shared with the Recruiter.

FINAL INTERVIEW

Following the conclusion of the Pre-Interview Screening, the Recruiter will prepare the Final Interview List and share it with the RCC at least 48 hours before the scheduled interview, along with a list of waitlisted candidates. If any selected applicant from the Final Interview List is unavailable for the interview, the Recruiter may choose to interview waitlisted candidates if deemed appropriate. If the Recruiter does not have a Pre-Interview Screening procedure, the list of interested students will automatically serve as the Final Interview List.

DISCLOSURE OF OFFERS

The RCC will announce the results collectively at the end of the day to guarantee impartiality among recruiters. Recruiters must reveal the outcomes of their Final Interviews and any offers extended to applicants solely through the RCC, and this information will be conveyed in a sealed envelope.

RECRUITMENT COORDINATION COMMITTEE

The Recruitment Coordination Committee (RCC) is the official student body responsible for managing and facilitating the recruitment process for the graduating Class of 2027. The RCC was established to create a seamless and structured platform where representatives from the legal industry can engage with students, with the aim of fostering meaningful recruitment opportunities.

The Committee is governed by its own By-Laws and is composed of students elected by their peers through a secret ballot process. This brochure extends a warm invitation to all prospective recruiters to participate in the placement process.
